E-ENTERPRISE FOR THE ENVIRONMENT LEADERSHIP COUNCIL (EELC)

At the heart of E-Enterprise is collaborative partnership: A commitment made by Tribal, State, and Federal Partners to work together using a transformative model of shared governance. EELC responsibilities include identifying, soliciting, reviewing, and prioritizing E-Enterprise projects, identifying new and existing State and U.S. EPA resource investments needed to support these projects, and ensuring alignment of projects and program activities with E-Enterprise principles.

TRIBAL SUPPORT

Cherokee Nation works closely with the Tribal EELC Representatives to support the Tribal involvement and participation in EELC. Cherokee Nation not only ensures that Tribal EELC Representatives are able to participate during the in-person EELC Meetings by providing reimbursements and flight assistance, but also provides assistance with regional report outs, facilitating tribal lead discussions, and providing updates and preparation for upcoming meetings.

Quality Assurance Project Plans (QAPP):

Through E-Enterprise, EPA, States, and Tribes worked together to improve the QAPP process and optimize technology support, ultimately resulting in a more timely and transparent process.

E-Enterprise Community Inventory Platform (EECIP):

The E-Enterprise Community Inventory Platform (EECIP) is an online community and living project inventory for States, local, Tribal, and other environmental agencies and their employees across the United States.

Information in the database spans a broad range of topics including IT, process improvement, advanced monitoring, and Exchange Network data flows.
